

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Welcome to the North Central Sociological Association's 2015 Annual Meeting!

And welcome to Cleveland, the site of Alcoholics Anonymous co-founder Dr. Bob's final public talk (at AA's first International Convention in July 1950). Because he was struggling with cancer at the time, Dr. Bob was only able to offer a few brief comments to the thousands in attendance before his energy failed. But they were memorable words indeed: "Our Twelve Steps, when simmered down to the last, resolve themselves into the words 'love' and 'service." Let us carry this spirit of love and service with us into our sessions, our social events, and back to our everyday lives after these meetings have concluded. It is difficult to imagine how we might engage with our conference theme -- "New Visions of Human Flourishing" -- without also attending to love and service. So as you renew connections with old friends and meet new ones in Cleveland, I invite you to become more mindful of the relationships among love, service, and human flourishing, not only as conceptual issues but also as practical strategies for creating a life of meaning and purpose.

Our theme this year builds on recent NCSA Presidential Addresses on topics such as "Rational Altruism," "Solidarity," and "Loving Kindness," as well as last year's conference theme ("Doing Good"). The NCSA helps so many people flourish, including undergraduate and graduate students, applied sociologists, university and community college faculty, and high school teachers and their students. It has always been a nurturing place for sociologists of all types to grow so that we may help others grow. The ultimate purpose of the discipline of sociology remains contested. But one goal that has made it meaningful for many of us is envisioning and working towards creating a world in which more people are able to thrive and achieve their fullest potential. Perhaps our conference can help us become more aware of this impulse and find ways to more intentionally and effectively put it into practice.

Related to our theme, I am especially pleased that Dr. Layli Maparyan, the Katherine Stone Kaufmann '67 Executive Director of the Wellesley Centers for Women and Professor of Africana Studies at Wellesley College, will deliver the 2015 Ruth and John Useem Plenary Address. The title of her presentation is, "A Womanist Perspective on Human Flourishing." Dr. Maparyan combines social scientific research on identities and communities with a unique approach to feminist work. A pioneer in advancing feminist and womanist values to create an agenda for change, her research and applied projects transcend traditional disciplinary boundaries and advocate for a more holistic approach to womanist theory. An advocate for blending spirituality with consciousness raising efforts to create and sustain social change, her research and civic involvement supports academic, public policy, and philanthropic initiatives directed toward women and groups that have traditionally faced exclusion.

As you consider which conference sessions to attend, I encourage you to shift your decision making lens from "which sessions will benefit me in terms of professional development or networking?" to "which sessions might provide me with an opportunity to be of benefit to others?" This may take the form of noticing a session with low attendance and deciding to attend that one, instead of a more popular session; or perhaps making sure to attend sessions that feature undergraduate and graduate students. Be sure to offer some encouragement to those who are attending our meetings for the first time and engage with folks at our social events who may be having difficulty joining in the conversations.



Finally, be sure to enjoy some of the many attractions of our host city. There is much to do in the area near the hotel, including the well-known Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. If you are able to make a short drive or take public transportation the museums in University Circle are world-class, especially the Museum of Art. I hope you enjoy the conference and that you leave more inspired and empowered to promote the flourishing of all people.

A Womanist Perspective on Human Flourishing

Womanism is a culturally informed social change perspective, pioneered by women of African descent and now widely embraced by people of diverse backgrounds and genders, that places healing, restoration, reverence, and love at the center of social change praxis. Based in a "politics of invitation," rather than the more customary "politics of opposition," womanists work to bring harmony, wellness, and commonweal in place of violence, suffering, and oppression. Stated differently, womanists work towards human flourishing. Understanding that human, environmental, and spiritual concerns are always inextricably intertwined, womanists pursue holistic, dynamic, and integrated strategies for solving social, ecological, and psycho-spiritual problems. Pioneers of this praxis have tended to "fly under the radar" because the "way of the womanist" is so embedded in the everyday. Yet, stories of several notable exemplars of womanist praxis from around the world will be shared to make this "way" more visible and accessible for those who care about improving the welfare of human beings and the planet. The "womanist way" towards human flourishing will also be applied to a number of current issues to highlight alternatives for change.

Layli Maparyan, Ph.D., is the Katherine Stone Kaufmann '67 Executive Director of the Wellesley Centers for Women and Professor of Africana Studies at Wellesley College. Her scholar-activist work interweaves insights and methodologies from the social sciences and the critical disciplines, toward the ends of gender equality, social justice, and human wellbeing. Best known for her groundbreaking womanist scholarship, Dr. Maparyan edited (as Layli Phillips) The Womanist Reader (Routledge, 2006), which documents the first quarter century of womanist scholarship from an interdisciplinary perspective. Her most recent book is The Womanist Idea (Routledge, 2012), a comprehensive treatment of womanist worldview and activist methodology. Dr. Maparyan has also published significantly in women's studies, Africana studies, and psychology. She is a former Fulbright Specialist at the University of Liberia and former Contemplative Practice Award recipient from the Center for Contemplative Mind in Society. Currently, she sits on the Sirleaf Market Women's Fund Board of Directors and the Center for the Study of Men and Masculinities Advisory Council, and is a member of the Women's Solidarity Society of the National Center for Civil and Human Rights. She is a graduate of Spelman College (B.A.), Penn State (M.S.), and Temple University (Ph.D.).


ASA Invites NCSA Members to Join Us in Chicago for the 2015 Annual Meeting

The Mindful Society: Contemplative Sociology, Meta-Mindfulness, and Human Flourishing Given by Matthew Lee (U of Akron) mlee2@uakron.edu

Mindfulness as both a spiritual and a secular practice has been gaining adherents in North America, as well as scientific legitimacy as a path to healing for an endless variety of physical and emotional ailments. There is also an emerging social movement that posits mindfulness as a solution to many social problems that otherwise might remain intractable. Indeed, influential social and political leaders are promoting the ideal of a "mindful society" or a "mindful nation" as a foundation for increased human flourishing and ecological well-being. My address explores these developments from a sociological perspective, offering a kind of meta-mindfulness: a sociological awareness of the pros and cons of the ways in which mindfulness has been adapted to our cultural milieu. In the process, I offer suggestions on the positive contributions that sociology might make to the mindfulness social movement, with special attention to the concept of sociological mindfulness. I suggest that sociology has an important role to play in the shift toward the contemplative that is happening in higher education across many disciplines. This shift seeks to educate the "whole person" and in the process enable people to solve the problems associated with the currently dominant, compartmentalized, and narrowly instrumental educational process.

John F. Schnabel Distinguished Contribution to Teaching Award

John F. Schnabel (1932-2005) served for a quarter of a century in the Sociology Department at University of West Virginia. He was a major advocate for teaching undergraduates, both within the ASA and within the NCSA.

John was an early leader in the ASA's early "Projects on Teaching" and in the Departmental Resources Group, conducting many workshops on innovative teaching. He was tireless in serving in various leadership roles and as a mentor to new faculty. John was instrumental in founding of the NCSA Teaching Committee and served as its first Chair from 1985 to 1988. Prior to the founding of that committee, annual NCSA meetings typically had one or two teaching sessions (out of more than a hundred sessions). By the end of his three-year tenure as Chair, there were eight. Under his tutelage, subsequent committee chairs worked to expand the teaching program, and by the early 1990s, the NCSA would annually list more than twenty teaching sessions.

The criteria and the process for the NCSA's Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award were crafted by John himself. He held many leadership positions in the NCSA Council and was always a solid source of advice and counsel. He was a tireless worker who energized all who knew him.

Aida Tomeh Distinguished Service Award

The Aida Tomeh Distinguished Service Award is an annual award recognizing a member of the NCSA who has given outstanding service to the NCSA, either through a single exceptional activity, or through different activities over an extended period of time, or throughout his/her professional career. The award is named after Aida Tomeh, who was a member of the faculty at Bowling Green State University from 1965 until her untimely death in 1984, following a long illness. Her undergraduate degree was from the American University in Beirut, and her PhD was from the University of Michigan (1962). Following Michigan, her faculty positions started at Bowling Green (1962), then Beirut University College (1963-1965), then back to Bowling Green, where she remained for the rest of her career.


She was a regular session organizer and presenter at professional meetings, on topics as far ranging as antique shopping to language maintenance among Arab Americans. Aida was especially committed to the NCSA, to which she devoted an extraordinary amount of time and energy. In addition to coordinating the mid-annual meetings of the Council which were always held in Bowling Green, she served as Executive Secretary (1974-1977), Council Member-at-Large (1977-1980), and Chair of the Development Committee (1980-1984).



J. Milton Yinger Distinguished Career in Sociology Award





During his career, Milt contributed to (1) sociological theory, (2) sociology of religion, (3) race and ethnic relations, and (4) sociology of countercultures. Each area where he did work, he left a legacy. Milt's "field theory" was one of the early attempts to move sociological theory toward a closer look at social process and at the dynamism of an organism within its complex environment. His book, *Toward a Field Theory of Behavior* was an important theoretical contribution in the early 1960s. His book *The Scientific Study of Religion* was the gold standard of texts in the sociology of religion, and he opened doors to new ways of conceptualizing and measuring the

essence of religiosity. In the field of racial and ethnic relations, he and Oberlin colleague George Simpson were awarded the Anifield Wolf Award for best scholarly work in 1958. The notion of "countercultures" is of specially interest, since he quite literally coined the concept. His American Sociological Review article in 1960 was reprinted in 15 anthologies and translated into many languages.

Milt was President of the NCSA and held several elected positions in the ASA. In fact, Milt is the only past President of NCAS to also was elected President of ASA. Further, Milt Yinger is the only person from any region of the country to be elected President of American Sociological Association while being employed

at a teaching-oriented liberal arts college. He taught at Oberlin College from 1947 to 1987. In the fall of 2006, in his 90th year, he had an article translated and published in Chinese.

Milt Yinger was an academician par excellence, but he also believed in applied sociology. This is part of the wisdom of J. Milton Yinger:

Can the scholar be content with identifying key problems and seeking to understand them? In my judgment, no. Values without knowledge are blind. Knowledge without values is empty. Both without policies are futile. That credo unites the diverse elements in my scholarly and social action efforts.
